#### Acknowledgement of Country

## Pope Francis on Real Treasure:

We are called upon to assume the attitude of the man and the merchant in the Gospel, so that we too may become healthily restless seekers of the Kingdom of Heaven. It is a matter of abandoning the heavy burden of our worldly certainties that prevent us from searching and building up the Kingdom: the covetousness

for possession, the thirst for profit and power, and thinking only of ourselves. Jesus, who is the hidden treasure and the pearl of great value, cannot but inspire joy, all the joy of the world: the joy of discovering a meaning in life, the joy of committing oneself to the adventure of holiness.. *Homily 26 July 2020* 

#### Looking at the Gospel:

Two themes seem to weave through the readings for this Sunday: treasure and delight. The treasure is the extraordinary gift that comes from God; the delight is the joy that we experience when we realise that the treasure is ours. A third theme, which is found in the first reading, picks up a theme that we have considered several times during this period of Ordinary Time, namely, service of others. The treasure is the kingdom of heaven. It is the prize that gives meaning to the present, and its fullest delight draws us into the future. The reign of God is the fulfilment of our deepest desires and our fondest hopes. Nothing in the world can compare with it, and that is why we are willing to sacrifice everything to attain it. The treasure that we find is really a gift that is given. We need not work to attain the kingdom, nor can we earn it in any way. It is given to us by God. All we have to do is accept it. Solomon chose to be of service to others. In this he is a model for disciples to follow. We have discovered the treasure in the field; we have found the pearl of great price. What we have been given, we must now give to others. In giving we will lose nothing. In fact, we gain an abundance of blessings. All things work for good, and God is glorified in all. Morning Prayer: Evening Prayer: The Liturgy of the Hours, also called the Divine Office is the official book of prayers of the church. The daily prayers are set out in "Hours". The two hinges of the day are morning and evening prayer with smaller "hours" completing the day: prayer during the day and night prayer. Also included is the Office of Readings. The morning prayer is also known as "Lauds" from the Latin "Laudate" meaning Praise coming from the last three Psalms. It is one of the most ancient Christian rites tracing back to the Apostles. The Prayer is recited at daybreak to give praise to God for the new day and to offer the work of the forthcoming day to the Lord. It consists of several elements: a hymn, a morning psalm, an Old Testament canticle, a psalm of praise, short scripture reading and responsory, the Benedictus (hymn of Zechariah), intercessions, the Lord's Prayer and concluding prayer or Collect. The texts and antiphons are according to the liturgical day, season or feast. Evening Prayer is also known as Vespers and recited at the end of the day's work or at sunset. Compline or Night Prayer is recited before retiring. Vespers follow the same structure as that of Morning Prayer but with three variations. The psalmody contains two psalms and a New Testament canticle. The Magnificat, hymn of Mary (Luke 1:39-56) is said or sung and the intercessions are more general praying for the church, the world and people in need, the sick and the dead, similar to the Prayer of the Faithful at Mass. Evening Prayer and Night Prayer were often combined into one liturgy in parish churches, as distinct from monasteries and convents. The Eastern churches and the Anglican church maintain this old tradition. This prayer is traditionally called Evensong in English.



# **Our Parish - Our History Continues**

## <u> 1967....</u>



In 1967, to accommodate this increased population, a totally new Sacred Heart Church was built on its current site, it was blessed and opened in November by Bishop of Sandhurst, B.D. Stewart with Mgr M.J. Bowman. The Sacred Heart presbytery (Now the Parish Centre) was built in 1978. In January 1974, the Wodonga Catholic Parish was split into two with the new Sacred Heart Parish taking the developing areas to the South and West of Wodonga. Each had its own Parish Priest and Assistant Priests. Fr G. Moylan was the first Parish Priest of the new Sacred Heart Parish. However in 1990 this division was reversed and the two parishes were merged into one Parish, Wodonga Catholic Parish.

As Wodonga grew so did the need for educational facilities. St. Augustine's which accommodated year 1 to intermediate level, was officially blessed and opened on April 27, 1902, becoming a Primary School in 1976, with the expansion of Catholic College. In 1973 St Monica's Primary School was established. Wodonga Catholic College (est 1957) moved and expanded to its current site in West Wodonga. Founded by the Wodonga Catholic Parish in 1979.

More recently in 2005, Frayne College was established in Baranduda. Catholic Education Wodonga was established as a body to plan, co-ordinate and supervise the development of Catholic Education in Wodonga. Frayne College, now St Francis of Assisi Primary School, renamed in 2015, marks a new era in the history for Catholic education in Wodonga, announcing in April 2023, plans for a Foundation to Year 12 provision with the exploration of Kindergarten/Preschool education, anticipating the first Year 7 classes will begin in 2029. Since 1876 when St Augustine's Primary School was established by the Sisters of Mercy, parishioners have been open with giving hearts, supporting the Catholic education of our children. Today, being associated with this tradition of the Sisters of Mercy, we inherit the legacy of the vision and practice of Catherine McAuley.

### Mercy Sisters:

In a wealthy country like Australia, a time with no government schools seems unimaginable. However, back in the 1840s, when the Sisters of Mercy opened the first secondary school in W.A., there were only a few tiny private schools. Many children, particularly girls, received no formal education. Making education more accessible, their way of life also offered one of few leadership opportunities for women. The Sisters demonstrated entrepreneurial and diplomatic skills while developing education in Australia. Their work required them to navigate hostile male hierarchies, religious discrimination, class struggles and complex relationships with Aboriginal peoples. Ursula Frayne led the first group of Sisters of Mercy to Australia, establishing the first secondary school in WA and modelled for us all respectful relationships with the Indigenous peoples.
