Message from Pope Francis ~Season of Creation 2023

"In this Season of Creation, as followers of Christ on our shared synodal journey, let us live, work and pray that our common home will teem with life once again."

Here, immersed in creation, we can also sense another beating: the maternal heartbeat of the earth. Just as the hearts of babies in the womb beat in harmony with those of their mothers, so in order to grow as people, we need to harmonize our own rhythms of life with those of creation, which gives us life" During this Season of Creation, let us dwell on those heartbeats: our own and those of our mothers and grandmothers, the heartbeat of creation and the heartbeat of God. Today they do not beat in harmony; they are not harmonized in justice and peace. Too many of our brothers and sisters are prevented from drinking from that mighty river. Let us heed our call to stand with the victims of environmental and climate injustice, and to put an end to the senseless war against creation. **Season of Creation begins Friday September 1st and concludes Wednesday October 4th**

Looking at the Readings:

The Prophet Isaiah described the transfer of authority to Eliakim in symbolic ways: putting on a robe, sash and giving him a key. Eliakim is to rule like a father and a king in the line of David. This reading connects well with the Gospel passage of Jesus conferring authority onto Peter. He is proven to be a leader among the apostles both in faith and deed-always the first to express faith in Jesus as the Christ and one to whom we go and the first to jump into the deep, enter the tomb, ask the important questions and make the hard decisions (John 6:68-69) and to speak out at Pentecost (Acts 2) The authority which Jesus gives to Peter: to bind on earth things of the kingdom of heaven, to strengthen his fellow disciples (Luke 22:31) to feed his sheep (John 21) and to build his church on rock, continues after the death of Peter. Another takes Peter's place in Jerusalem when he leaves for Rome and another takes leadership in Rome when he is martyred. We see the wisdom of God is choosing a frail and sinful man as leader and the power and might of God to be with his church in good times and bad.

Did You Know?

Caesarea Phillipi was a town situated 40km north of the Sea of Galilee and the furthest north Jesus and the apostles travelled. The town and district were noted for its pagan originals and temples. Herod the Great built a temple to Caesar Augustus; and after his death, Herod's son, Phillip, renamed the city Caesarea Phillipi after Tiberius Caesar and himself to distinguish from Caesarea a coastal city. It is intriguing that Matthew's gospel chooses such a site as the location for such a significant revelation of faith.

Liturgical Jottings - Gospel Sequence

The twenty-first and twenty-second Sundays in Ordinary time form a new sequence. In the first excerpt from the Gospel of Matthew, Peter stands out among Jesus' disciples. In the calming of the storm, Peter shows extraordinary faith by leaping out of the boat to reach Jesus. But then Jesus reaches out to save him. In the second excerpt Peter speaks up declaring that Jesus is "the Messiah, the Son of the living God." In his turn, Jesus entrusts him with an unexpected responsibility in the community. But then Peter immediately finds it hard to accept that Jesus must undergo his passion. Again Jesus rebukes him. Despite the ups and down, Peter clearly shows his leadership among the Apostles. Although brief, this sequence has a great importance for us to under-stand the mystery of the Church

In this year's Social Justice Statement, Listen, Learn, Love: A New Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, the Australian Bishops join with the National Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) to call on us to develop relationships of humility and love with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. NATSICC supports a Yes vote in the upcoming Referendum. The Bishops do not tell us how to vote but they urge us to inform ourselves and to LISTEN to First Nations People [NATSICC] about their experiences and hopes. The referendum is an important moment in our history. As the Bishops and NATSICC say, we, in the Church, can model how Jesus' way of love can make a difference. When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' 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My Pilgrimage (Portland to Penola)

In the footsteps of St Mary Mackillop Australia's 1st canonized saint-From Melbourne to Portland

My Aussie Camino has begun with the spirit of St Mary of the Cross: Victoria & South Australian border we criss-crossed, we walked on cliff tops, no good with flip flops. We trod on a long sandy beach in the rain

Braved and survived through rugged terrain. We walked through enchanted and petrified forests, unused railways, and along the lakes, Soaking all in: rain or shine, pain and blister; whatever it takes, thank God, there's no storm or hail, though we've spent a night in Mt Gambier jail. Then to Bush Haven, we camped for our 6th night resting our legs, or treating blisters, or just to be safe from nocturnal animals' bite.

From the camp Bush Haven emerges the party of eleven, to tread onwards to our next stop Kalangadoo, where we met Peter, the remnant king of the rail

K'doo., surviving through a cold night at our accommodation, we left K'doo excited for Penola, our final destination. Kalangadoo to Penola takes the longest walk, regular rest is a must and a friend's encouraging talk, walking through electric and barbed wired fence was a challenge but that did not stop us, our walking spirit did not change.

The long stretch of the road seems like eternity but the goal is on sight, we'll get there eventually. The ancient gum trees and sheep farms along the way, the horses' neighs and the cattle mooing behind their pile of hay

provide welcome and much -needed distraction as our trek gets closer to its conclusion.

At last, we have arrived at Penola town, the place where this Aussie Camino gets its reason....

A place, so serene, historic and where everybody is welcome. For St Mary Mackillop, everyone here must feel at home. Fr Junjun
