

On The Cover-An Artistic Interpretation - Pentecost

Ladislav Záborský A Catholic Artist: Imprisoned for His Catholic Art .

His mission in life is to spread joy, Christian optimism and religious belief in eternal life.

Catholic artist, Ladislav Záborský was sentenced in Slovakia for treason to seven years imprisonment in 1954 but was released on Christmas Eve 1957. His crime? He painted Christ as a worker in 1949. Záborský went to high school in Banská Bystrica and studied at the Drawing and Painting Department of the Slovak University of Technology in Bratislava, his main professors were Martin Benka, Gustáv Mallý and Ján Mudroch.

In 1945 he married Gabriela Bartošová. Together they had three children:

After graduation he worked as high school teacher in Martin. Because of his religious activities he was condemned to seven year imprisonment from 1953 to 1957. He experienced interrogation, intimidation, demanding prison conditions and threatening, too. Záborský spent five months in solitary confinement where he wrote thirty poems depicting his feelings and talks to God.

As Ladislav Záborský was forbidden to continue to work as high school teacher, he started a career as book illustrator, painter and church artist (stained glass windows in 25 churches and 21 "Stations of the Cross"). The essence of his work is linked to the experience of his inner life.

Each painting is an attempt to discover God and a dialogue with eternity. He is more than a religious painter; he is a painter of spiritual light. He says about himself: "The substance of my work is the experience of God transferred into my heart". "Art that seeks truth and beauty, is the anticipation of eternity."

His work has been shown in exhibitions in Venice/Italy (1943); Košice (1946, 1993); Ružomberok (1947); Poprad (1960, 1963); Starý Smokovec (1962); París/France (1969); Žilina (1972, 1983, 1999, 2006); Bratislava (1973); Trnava (1973); Martin, Turčianska galéria (1991, 1996, 2001, 2006); Tisovec (1974); Liptovský Mikuláš (1995); Piešťany (1997); Vrútky (1999); Nitra (2000); Vranov nad Topľou (2001); Topoľčany (2002); Kežmarok (2007).

Liturgical Jottings

Liturgical Language III

From the Protestant Reformation and the Counter Reformation. Latin was used in the Catholic West, in Eastern Churches various ancient and local languages were used in the liturgy. A few exceptions were in some Eastern European nations and in the New World, e.g. Mexico and China where local languages were approved and adopted. But after Pius V Roman Missal was promulgation in 1570 these exceptions were suppressed for about 200 years.

With Vatican Council II the vernacular languages were re-introduced and after 40-50 years many indigenous languages were approved.

In the lead-up to the Plenary, NATSICC has developed guidelines for embracing Aboriginal peoples in the life of the Church http://www.natsicc.org.au/assets/eatsicc [May 27 is the anniversary of the 1967 Referendum when Australians voted to remove discriminatory clauses in the Constitution.

June 3 marks the historic 1992 Mabo decision recognizing Aboriginal peoples' rights over their lands.]

The 28th of May 2020, during this year's #NRW, marks the 20th Anniversary of the Reconciliation Walk across the Sydney Harbour Bridge in the year 2000, where 250,000 people walked together in an act of unity, calling for true Reconciliation to be realised in this nation.

This is still the largest public gathering in Australia's history.

Today I will speak out against racism, discrimination and injustice.

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

Looking at the Readings:

Pentecost celebrates the fullness of the Spirit and the great gathering of nations. It brings the Easter season to its conclusion. The Risen Lord has been exalted to his rightful place next to God and he has sent his Spirit to fill the earth with God's power. The world is charged with divine energy; it needs but a spark to ignite it with life and with excitement. This vitality explodes into the extraordinary. Tongues are loosed and speech overflows its linguistic constraints; charismatic gifts flood the valleys of human habitation; barred doors are burst open and frightened hearts are calmed. The Spirit of the Lord fills the whole world.

Once again we gather together for one reason, only to discover that God has gathered us for another. BOOKING FOR Mass

My dear Parishioners

Brothers and sisters in Christ.

The recent announcement of the Victorian Government to ease some of the restrictions is a welcome news and must have provided relief to many of us.

We can now catch up with our family and friends although still limited to 5 people with social distancing still to be observed.

We can also now return to Church and attend Mass in public once again on weekends and weekdays if you prefer.

However as recommended, **only 10 people** are allowed to be in our public liturgical celebration; plus 3 or no more than 4 people who may be doing specific roles in the liturgy (eg. Lector, Musician/singer, technical assistant, door attendant).

I know many of you loved going to Mass to partake in Holy Communion and just enjoy the company of each other as a community of faith.

Yet to adhere with the directives we are to put some things in place. When you come to Mass, please observe social distancing (1.5 metres) apart. The seats in the Church are marked where you are to sit. Please use the hand sanitiser provided or if you have your own, bring this with you.

If you are feeling unwell (or coughing, sneezing, etc), stay on the side of caution by staying at home.

To facilitate the cleaning of places in the Church that we may be in contact with, we will just be using one entry and exit point.

At Sacred Heart Church, we will be using the Main front Doors. These will be opened before the Mass and closed once Mass begins.

Also to be fair with the parishioners we will be using a **booking system**.

As per the bishop's directive when coming to Mass you need to check in. -

When booking, Sonni will take down your details. When you arrive at the Church your name will be checked off.

This is for accountability and care for you especially when we need to contact you. Having said this, we respect your privacy as we assure you we abide with our Parish Privacy policy in handling your personal information.

First Reading: Acts 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome - Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Second Reading: Acts 12:3-7. 12-13

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' unless he is under the influence of the Holy Spirit.

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose.

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

Gospel: John 20:19-23

In the evening of the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them.

He said to them.

'Peace be with you,'

and showed them his hands and his side.

The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord,

and he said to them again,

'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.

For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'
