Season of Creation 5

Greeting:

We gather recognising all creation. We recall St Francis relationship with the Sun, Earth, Moon, Water and all living creatures as brothers and sisters.

Reflection:

St Paul urges us to keep on doing good things and the God of peace will be with us. St Francis, faithful to Scripture, invites us to see nature as a magnificent book in which God speaks to us and grants us a glimpse of his infinite beauty and goodness. His motto: Pax Et Bonum ... Peace and Goodness.

Looking at the Readings:

There are two lessons in today's Gospel. We must heed both lessons with renewed minds and hearts to avoid a wretched end and to be received into the divine vineyard: the Kingdom of Heaven.

Again Jesus addresses another parable to the priests of the Temple and the elders of the people. They are aware of the social situation of the day where absent landowners reap considerable wealth from their underpaid servants. With whom do they side? Here is a lesson on social justice, just wage, and care for the poor.

The parable also contains a lesson on the way to salvation. The first reading shows the vineyard as God's house and the people as the vine and grapes. Responsibility for good yields rests with the owners and the workers: indeed a shared responsibility with the Creator and God's People. Jesus challenges his hearers to be just, fair and dutiful, honest and trustworthy. Owners and workers both may come to a wretched end All must be worthy of the gift of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Feast of the Week:

St Francis of Assisi 4 October

Because this feast falls on a Sunday, it may only be celebrated in places that observe it as a Solemnity. Celebrations of St Francis may also be remembered on another suitable day.

First Reading: Isaiah 5:1-7

Let me sing to my friend the song of his love for his vineyard. My friend has a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, I ask you to judge between my vineyard and me.

What could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done? I expected it to yield grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead?

Very well, I will tell you what I am going to do to my vineyard: I will take away its hedge for it to be grazed on, and knock down its wall for it to be trampled on. I will lay it waste, unpruned, undug; overgrown by the briar and the thorn. I will command the clouds to rain no rain on it. Yes, the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the House of Israel, and the men of Judah that chosen plant. He expected justice, but found bloodshed, integrity, but only a cry of distress.

Second Reading: Philippians 4:6-9

There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayer and thanksgiving, and that peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand, will guard your hearts and your thoughts, in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers, fill your minds with everything that is true, everything that is noble, everything that is good and pure, everything that we love and honour, and everything that can be thought virtuous or worthy of praise. Keep doing all the things that you learnt from me and have been taught by me and have heard or seen that I do. Then the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel: Matthew 21:33-43

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. 'They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see? 'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'

World Cerebral Palsy Day. October 6th 2020.

About 1 in 700 babies in Australia is born with some degree of cerebral palsy. Muscle coordination is impaired due to damage to the brain at or before birth. There is no cure so rehabilitation, medication and orthopedic management are used to improve motor skills and communication. Because of modern technology, many people with CP can live independently and join the workforce with some adjustments made to equipment and schedules.

Spring forward



Moving our clocks can disrupt our sleep patterns. Our internal body clock or 24 hour circadian rhythm will have to adjust to the time shift. Although most people will do this without any problem, we do need to be aware that there is an increased chance of sleepiness while the body adjusts to the new

timeframe. Our circadian rhythms are timed to match the environmental cycle of light and darkness. Daylight saving throws our circadian rhythms out of sync because we are suddenly required to wake at a time when the body clock is still programmed for sleep. However, if you adjust your bedtime earlier for 3 or 4 nights before the Spring daylight savings transition, you will reduce the risk of sleep loss, and be less susceptible to sleepiness the following day.
