

Teach us to Pray

I: BEGINNINGS

Ultimately, our restless aching is a yearning for God. We need to connect with God. We need prayer. We know this, both in our more reflective moments and in our more desperate moments. It is then that we feel our need for prayer and try to go to that deep place. But given our lack of trust and our lack of practice, we struggle to get there. There is no bad way to pray and there is no one starting point for prayer. All the great spiritual masters offer only one non-negotiable rule: You have to show up for prayer and you have to show up regularly. BREATH PRAYER: Sit in a comfortable position in a supporting chair, or lie flat on the floor. Close your eyes and also your body to relax. If you are aware of any tension in yourself, tense and then relax each part of your body until you find yourself in a state of relaxed awareness, and you are letting yourself be totally supported by the chair or the floor. Allow your mind to relax also and let yourself be at peace. ... Focus on the action of breathing in. Think of the air you breathe as God's gift to you; breathe in gift; breathe in life; breathe in God. ... Continue to breathe in life, to breathe in God, and to breathe out your weakness, each time filling the space thus made with life until you imagine yourself alive and filled with the gift of God. II: THE OUR FATHER - THE PRAYER THAT JESUS TAUGHT US

- We have to pray to the Father! It is a powerful word, "father". We have to pray to the one who has begotten us, the one who has given us life. He has given life to everyone ... He has given life to you. He has given life to me. He is the one who accompanies us on our journey. He knows our whole lives, the good and the not-so-good Pope Francis, Our Father, 11.
- ... he is our Father! I am not an only child; none of us is ... Pope Francis, Our Father, 12.
- We go home ... we know a father is waiting there for us ... Yes, he is always there waiting for us. And "in heaven" he is powerful and great and majestic this is what the expression "who art in heaven" means but he is close and walks with us. Pope Francis, Our Father, 32.
- "Hallowed be thy name" means it should be hallowed, it should be revered and honoured, in us, in me. ... God's name is mercy ... Pope Francis, Our Father, 39.
